Background

OUR PURPOSE

York is one of the oldest racecourses in the world, with racing first starting on the Knavesmire in 1731. As we approach our 300 year anniversary in 2031, we are committed to ensuring that the racecourse continues to play a positive role in both the sport of horseracing, and the City of York, for at least another 300 years.

As part of this commitment, York Race Committee and every member of the York Racecourse management team, has committed to supporting our environmental goals, across energy and emissions, biodiversity, water management, waste and resource use.

Together, we have been able to deliver real change since we first began monitoring our impacts in 2017. From our carbon footprint and the stewardship of our acreage, to the management of water and waste, we have embedded sustainability into all areas of our operations.

This report details the changes achieved so far, and our ambitions going forwards.

OUR MISSION

Our mission is to host the best racing action, whilst delivering the best racegoer experience.

We shall strive to achieve this in as sustainable a way as possible.

We are proud of our near 300-year heritage, proud of our stewardship of the environment in which York Racecourse stands and proud to chart our direction for at least the next 300 years, following our strategy for environmental sustainability; **Green Knavesmire 300.**

We know that in order to enjoy a future that includes world-class horse racing, we need to minimise our negative impact on the environment, conserve precious resources and maximise our potential to have a positive impact through our land stewardship.

We are the sport of the land and the way in which we take care of it defines us.

Therefore, our undertaking is to set our own high standard in managing York Racecourse responsibly, ensuring that future generations can continue to enjoy racing at this wonderful place for centuries to come.

Our project, Green Knavesmire 300, focuses on four key pillars which enable us to achieve our bold vision:

ORIGINAL OBJECTIVES SET IN 2017 FOR SUSTAINABILITY AT YORK RACECOURSE

PILLAR TARGET We will address all areas of our emissions and build a plan Net Zero by that will reduce our scope 1, 2 and 3 to Net Zero by 2040 and 2040 assess the impact of racegoer travel (Scope F). We will undertake projects that enhance biodiversity on our site, engage in tree, hedge and other planting schemes, Enhance including a wildflower meadow, to support carbon biodiversity sequestration, create new habitats for wildlife, and increase our plants for pollinators, as well as add beehives to our spaces. We will seek to reduce the volume of water taken from mains supply, put in place a water management system, add Conserve rainwater harvesting to our new buildings and replace water bathroom facilities with more efficient systems when upgrades are due. We will eliminate single use plastic from our venue, improve our waste management plans and create operational Embrace the systems to ensure we maximise the value of our resources circular economy and make environmentally-conscious procurement choices.

We have solidified our environmental commitments by becoming the first independent racecourse to sign up to the UNFCCC Sport for Climate Action.

Our story so far

York Racecourse began its sustainability journey in 2017, with an overhaul of our activities. In 2023 we reviewed our progress with a full carbon footprint and audit of operations between 2017 and 2022. We delivered a number of changes in accordance with the recommendations of the audit and redeveloped the southern end of our site in alignment with the principles of sustainability, with the completion of the Bustardthorpe Development.

To date, operationally we have:

Reduced our direct emissions by over 50% from 2017 to 2024.

Reduced our reliance on mains water

Reduced our use of single use plastic on site

Brought beehives to York Racecourse

Planted more trees, flowers and shrubs on site to support pollinators and biodiversity

Recycled more waste than we incinerate, and developed an action plan to further reduce waste generation

Engaged our staff in more initiatives and projects

Completed the Bustardthrope Development in alignment with our sustainability strategy

Installed a living flower wall in the Ebor Fashion Lawn

Specifically, this has meant:

electric vehicle installed on site charging points

Single-use plastic waste reduced through the use of reusable cups in the Bustardthrope Development.

The bricks were made just 12 miles from the racecourse!

This reduced the emissions from contractor travel and supported our local economy and community.

Located at the southern end of the racecourse, this development was completed in Summer 2024. To meet with the standards and expectation of the York Racecourse environmental strategy, the development incorporated the following features:

- Solar photovoltaic (PV) panels on the roof
- Low-energy use through efficient lighting, equipment and a design that maximises natural light
- Rainwater harvesting, waterless urinals and water-efficient toilets
- Enhancement of existing and creation of new planted areas, including a green roof, new trees and planters with RHS pollinator-friendly plants.
- Back of house facilities designed to support waste sorting and increase recycling rates, and washing facilities for the use of reusable serveware (including cups), eliminating this former waste stream entirely.


Influencing positive change beyond our own operations

We are proud of the progress we have made so far towards achieving our sustainability goals. However, we know there is more for us to do, and 2025 marks the start of the next phase of work on sustainability for York Racecourse, as we fast approach the end of our first decade of focused environmental action.



What does 2025 - 2030 look like at York Racecourse?

Prioritising further emissions, waste and resource reductions across our operations.

We have an action plan in place for further reducing our reliance on fossil fuels, minimising resource use including mains water, sustainable catering opportunities, and engagement with our key suppliers on their own sustainability goals.

This includes being one of a small number of businesses to utilise the new UK Net Zero Carbon Building Standard for our Stableside development, which will drive our overall commitment to decarbonising the site.

Enhancing biodiversity

In 2025 we have embarked on a site-wide 'getting nature back on track' biodiversity project, to provide significant ecosystem benefits, such as an uplift in nature, improvements to soil health and carbon sequestration opportunities on site. We hope the outcomes will demonstrate the potential for the same nature-based projects at other British racecourses, with York creating a blueprint for wider-scale impact.

Amplify our voice and use our influence to inspire

In line with our UNFCCC commitments, we want to broaden our influence to inspire change throughout our communities. We will do this through our communications and stakeholder engagement plan.
